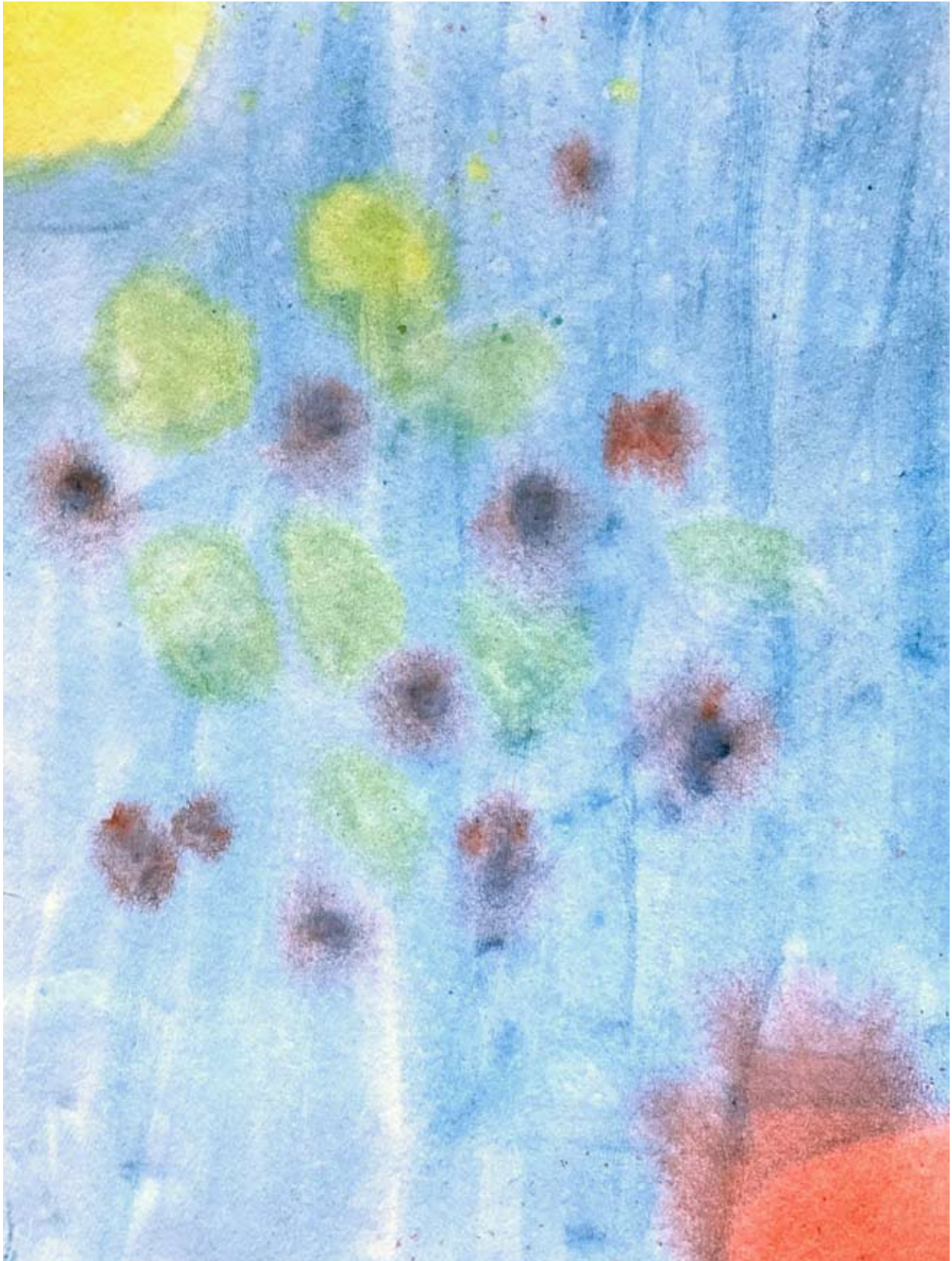

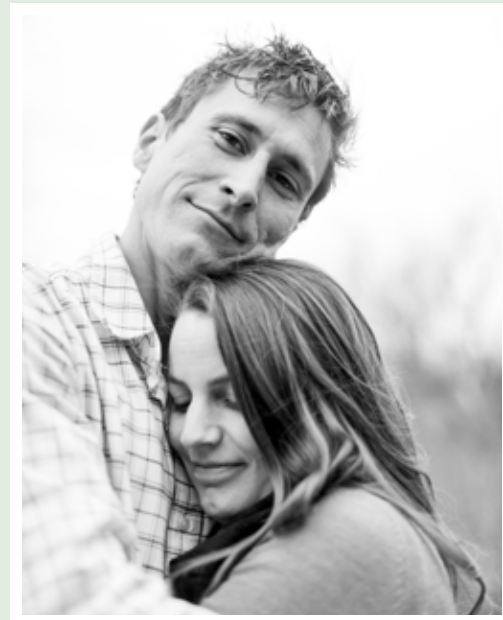

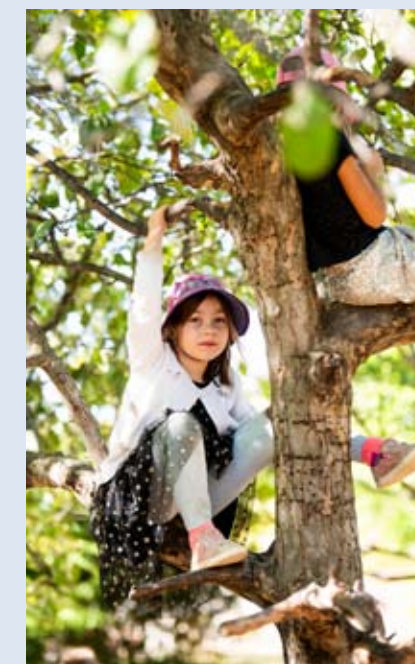
Want to learn more about Waldorf Education?!

Donor Spotlight: Diane and David Banner

Diane and David Banner moved to the Viroqua area in 1995. Their youngest child, Katelyn, joined the third grade that year with teacher Anne-Marie Fryer. Since then, the Banners have been an integral part of the Pleasant Ridge Waldorf Community. I recently asked Diane about her family's experience with PRWS.



How did you first connect with Pleasant Ridge? What drew you to the school?

When I was doing my own teacher training, I took advantage of the opportunity to visit the Chicago Waldorf schools, and this educational approach really resonated with me. Some years later, my daughter attended the Waldorf school in Sacramento for second and third grade. Katelyn immediately took to this education style and asked that we never send her to any other type of school! Meanwhile, David and I were on a search for a permanent place to settle down—we visited friends and family in cities and countryside in about 12 different states during the search. On a visit to Spring Green, Wisconsin, we fell in love with the area. Friends had told us about Pleasant Ridge. Upon contacting the school, we appreciated the welcoming tone of their correspondence. Our daughter's soon-to-be teacher, Anne-Marie Fryer, was warm and friendly.

In addition to being a PRWS parent, I also became a faculty and staff member. I spent a couple summers training in Waldorf education. After some substitute teaching, I took over as lead teacher for a class in their second and third grades. I then worked as the Enrollment Director for about seven years. I knew every student, family, grandparent, aunt and uncle and really enjoyed being so deeply immersed in the community.

What are your favorite memories from that time?

I always loved the assemblies. There were so many times where I felt a welling up in myself, bringing me to the edge of tears, because I was so moved by the beauty of what was offered—the songs, the movement, the recitations.

How has PRWS impacted your child and family?

My daughter learned a love for working with her hands that serves as a great balance to her computer-based job. Though she now has a little one of her own, which has cut down on her handwork time, she enjoys crocheting animals and has made many adorable gifts for nieces, nephews, and friends' children, including a duck with a beret who goes by Professor Quack. If it were not for her Waldorf education, she likely never would have learned to knit or crochet.

Our family as a whole has really come to appreciate Waldorf education. Even our sons, who were too old to attend PRWS when we moved to Viroqua, developed a deep appreciation through watching Kate's experience and development.

What do you appreciate most about PRWS?

I have had so much appreciation and respect for the passionate and talented faculty. Anne-Marie was a wonderful teacher and tremendous mentor. She loved her students as if they were her own children.

I also love how music, movement and arts are woven into everything. It makes the education so soulful, which unfortunately seems lacking in a lot of public and private education. Even mathematics is taught through movement! Another thing I really appreciate is the emphasis on balance and the rhythm of out-breaths and in-breaths, of bigger, louder activities followed by quieter, focused activities. This is healthy for all of us in life.

I value the sense of community in the school. The older children really know the younger children, and vice versa. They care about each other like a big extended family. The opportunities to volunteer side by side with other parents have also made me feel more connected.

How are you involved with the school today?

I've been volunteering to substitute teach, mostly in the Kindergarten, as needed. This year I'm excited to be reading to the first grade every day during their rest time. I also enjoy volunteering at the school library, helping to shelve books and keep things organized.

What hopes do you have for the school going forward?

I hope the school continues to attract outstanding teachers and new families both from outside of the area and from within. I hope the school continues to be flexible and maintains somewhat of a beginner's mind so that it is open to changing and evolving. Ultimately, I hope the school continues to thrive and provide a healthy education that helps young people become creative thinkers and doers.

Why do you choose to support PRWS financially?

My husband and I both are so appreciative of Waldorf education, this school and what it provides for the larger community. We truly want to see it continue to thrive, so every year we have given something. Some years we've been able to give more than others, but it's always been top of the list of what we want to support.

One year, we chose to donate in the form of trees planted in and around the school play yard. There was only one tree when we moved here! A few others were also inspired to supplement our donation with additional trees. This really transformed the environment for the children and community to better enjoy the space. I really enjoy the bursting of color from the autumn blaze maples in the fall!

Why do you think it's important for the whole community to support PRWS?

PRWS attracts and keeps families in the area, enriching our small town and making it more diverse and open. Many creative endeavors that have come out of families that have moved here have enriched the quality of life, whether they are contributing as a business owner, a musician or an artist. This infusion of creativity has made this community a healthier and more fulfilling place to live.



Therapeutic Eurythmy

Pleasant Ridge Waldorf School has hired Elsa Macauley, a therapeutic eurythmist, in a guest teacher capacity as we strive to build and fully fund our new therapeutic eurythmy program. Elsa comes to us from New York, where she worked with the Eurythmy Spring Valley Ensemble and offered therapeutic eurythmy to children at the Otto Specht School. During the summer Elsa moved to Viroqua with her husband, Marcus, and their daughter, Moira, and began working to find funding and support for the program.

As a trained therapeutic eurythmist employed by the school, she applied to ATHENA (the Association for Therapeutic Eurythmy in North America) and received a small grant to initiate the program, which PRWS matched. Elsa will work with the faculty as well as parents to help them understand the role of therapeutic eurythmy in child development for specific children and how it can help strengthen a whole class, in the context of our overall Integrated Student Support Program.

Through the development office, the school has been granted additional resources from the Waldorf School Fund and the Rudolf Steiner Charitable Trust to guarantee the program for this school year. The full cost of the therapy will be covered by the school to ensure that all children are able to participate.

The goals of the program are:

- (1) to experience how therapeutic eurythmy brings harmony and balance to students who are struggling.
- (2) that the program will continue to expand in relation to the needs of the school in support of the health of the students. The creation and expansion of therapeutic eurythmy is a perfect way to ensure that we work in an anthroposophically informed way in serving a diverse group of students.

In taking this step, Pleasant Ridge honors the pioneering work of Diane Mamroe and Annette Conlon, two former therapeutic eurythmists who taught pedagogical eurythmy at PRWS and organized weekend appointments for students twice a year. This feels like both a full-circle return and a giant step forward!

I returned from maternity leave mid-November and am happy to be jumping back into the thick of things. I'm also excited to share that we have a new Marketing and Events Coordinator: Kim Anderson. We are so thankful that Kim, with her extensive experience in events and fundraising, has joined the team. Grandparents and Special Friends Day is our biggest autumn event led by the Development Office. This year more than 100 guests came to experience an all-school assembly, observe Main Lesson, tour the school and subject classes, and socialize over a delicious lunch. Alumna Zoe (Coleman) Ellerbusch, class of 2001, was our guest speaker. Thanks to a grant awarded to the school, Zoe was able to work with PRWS as a school counselor one day per week in the 2023–2024 school year. She also led several trainings for the teachers to better support their own mental health and that of their students, in order to create the optimal environment for learning. Zoe is a licensed professional counselor (LPC) and works as a therapist through Stonehouse Counseling. Her husband, Joe, teaches Movement (Grades 4 and 6 through 8) and serves as a co-coordinator for Integrated Student Support at PRWS.

Zoe gave a wonderful presentation about our skilled teachers and the enthusiasm they put into meeting the children's needs. She specifically noted the high level of professionalism and passion with which the teachers approach each day, and her immense gratitude for the education her daughters (Everly, grade 2, and Gwenyth, Kindergarten) are receiving. As an example, she admired Ms. Beth's creativity in teaching multiplication to the second grade. Instead of the typical flashcards, the students traced the geometric pattern of the numbers by walking the form, they learned relation to each other through cooperative group achievement, and a sense of front brain mastery when all the pieces fit together. A Waldorf education continuously creates positive muscle memory through exploring movement and patterns with friends, which also instills a love for learning.

Zoe also engaged the audience in a fruitful discussion about specific ways we can better support our teachers and their classes. Some attendees asked questions about projects, classroom items, and/or training opportunities for teachers that could be funded in the future. This feedback supports our ongoing
